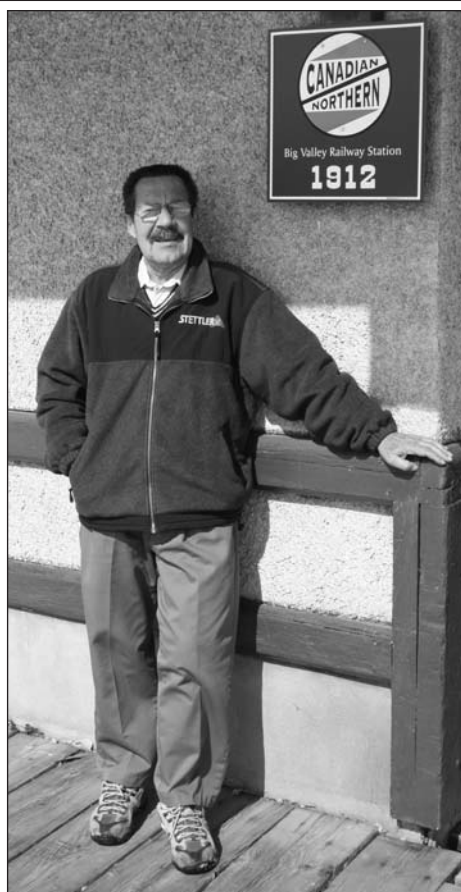

A Tribute to His Memory

It was the spring of 1989, and the Canadian Northern Society—a small group of local history buffs—had begun its work to preserve the Big Valley railway depot and roundhouse sites. Blessed with youthful enthusiasm, support from the community, and the prospect of a helping develop a tourist railway—featuring live steam locomotives pulling train loads of excursionists on the old Canadian Northern line, it was an exciting time to be part of the Big Valley community!

And it was from this point that Harry Stuber became “Mr. Canadian Northern” in Big Valley.

Selling countless memberships, promoting improvements, helping manage projects, and lending a hand in the work—Harry went from being a retired oil man to a first class railroader! Watching over the village’s treasured railway depot and Roundhouse Park, he ensured that these heritage sites would remain an important part of the fabric of the community.

Then of course there was Communities in Bloom, “the flag project,” and later the Canadian Railway Hall of Fame. Without Harry’s persistence and dedication, these projects would never have happened in Big Valley. And what of his work with the Historical Society as well—who could forget him climbing down the side of the elevator? Then there was the pumping unit display and installing the church bell chimes at St. Edmunds. Indeed, there is a bit of Harry Stuber in every corner of the Village. Big Valley, and the Canadian Northern Society in particular, will never be the same.

Those of us who valued Big Valley’s railway heritage and sought to preserve it also gained a true and unfailing friend. His commitment and dedication to the cause were second to none. His legacy must be allowed to live on.

Harry—you’ll be sincerely missed, but never forgotten.

You will note that in this edition of the *Chronicle*, there are listed the names of several new members, and there are as well acknowledgements to certain individuals who recently have contributed cash donations to our society. This is simply part of the legacy that Harry Stuber has left the society. He had an “unorthodox system”—as some call it—of selling memberships in the society! In reality, he was raising funds for the society in his own fashion, whether by selling a membership to someone interested in the group, or one to some of you who have—thankfully—contributed over the years thanks to Harry’s persistence! In any event, we thank all of you for your support, and again, must look back

at how Harry’s influence has just been so important to the profile and success of the Canadian Northern Society over the years.

Memorial donations are beginning to flow into the society in memory of Harry. We would sincerely like to thank Fran and her family for thinking of the society.

Thank you to Art Tizzard and Alana Stefanik for their help in keeping the station platform clear of snow this winter. In addition, we thank Lois Miller and the volunteers from the Big Valley Historical Society and the Big Valley Beautification Society who have continued to help keep the roundhouse site tidy and

presentable. Lois is going to put a work list together of some of the items that need attention at this site, and we would appreciate any volunteer assistance. It’s not a lot of work for those interested, and it sure helps keep this site a major attraction for the Village of Big Valley.

The Big Valley station and roundhouse committee had a meeting on January 25 to try and put together at least some initial plans for the upcoming summer and Alberta Prairie excursion train season. Through the co-ordination of the Big Valley Historical Society, the station and washrooms will once again remain available for arrivals of Alberta Prairie trains, and by appointment for other

guests during the Museum's opening hours. We also are counting on the Village to lend an appreciated helping hand in keeping the roundhouse site, and the railway yard area grass mowed. Thanks also to the Historical Society, we may be able to get a bit of painting and minor maintenance done this coming year through sharing the time of summer students.

The Big Valley Beautification Society has really "adopted" the depot gardens and does a great job. The Canadian Northern Society hopes to work closer with this group in the coming year as well.

The Northern Alberta Institute of Technology finished up their second conductor training program in early December. The Canadian Heartland Training Railway reports that they are yet uncertain as to the schedule for similar programs which of course use our Big Valley facilities. However the CHTR will be undertaking some "industry training" events at Big Valley this coming spring and summer, and will keep us abreast of developments.

We have two new interpretive signs to put up at the roundhouse site this coming year, and are working on some improvements to

the photographic displays in the station. On a related note, Lois Miller is working on putting all of the Big Valley Historical Society's heritage photographs on electronic media—with a plan to then have these available for sale to raise funds for their efforts. A great idea that we'll report back on.

Again, we could always use one or two more individuals just to help "steer" the efforts of the Canadian Northern Society in Big Valley. We'd love to hear from you if you could lend a hand.

Camrose News

The station activities since New Year's have concentrated on preparation for the coming season and our Valentine Supper held on February 14. We served 56 people a lovely gourmet meal accompanied by musical entertainment. We want to give special thanks to Carol Roy who once again decorated the King George Room and Tearoom in Victorian attire. Thanks to Dorothy Lysons for making desserts, Carol and Murray, Bill and Gladys, Robbie and Bruce for hostessing. We also want to thank Rebecca Bridger who ably prepared the main meal.

Diane has prepared the AMA grant for operations and will be soon working on the Service Canada grant for a university student. On February 11, Diane attended an Alberta museum grant workshop in Kingman. We are very happy with the changes to the grant program. Prior to November we will be able to apply for funding to match Diane's present salary.

Diane will be attending a public health workshop this month, as tearoom supervisors are required to hold a certificate. I have completed the procedural manual for the Tearoom that is now required by Public Health. Thank you Diane for all the work you are doing on the society's behalf. Hopefully we can increase Diane's hours in the future, as her first love is working with people in events and programming.

We have been trying to work out a model that will result in some paid help in the Tearoom. Diane has agreed to manage the summer Tearoom for 20 hours per week at the rate of pay we would have paid someone else. She will still fill her 13 hours a week as Director at her present salary funded by the city.

I will continue to assist in serving and where needed along with other volunteers and students. We have a number of young people who are willing to volunteer for tips again this summer. Cheryl Prestage has agreed to help when Diane is busy with events. I feel as long as we remember what we are about, we can continue to build and demonstrate a mutually respectful place where problems are seen as challenges and worked out as we go.

I have re-evaluated all our children's programs and we have booked as many schools as we can handle in May and June. Most schools and kindergartens book a year in advance. Instead of St. Patrick's Supper this year we are planning an Easter egg hunt followed by decorating of the coloured eggs and refreshments. This event is for children and adults as homemade hot cross buns, cheese and refreshments will be served. We will also have a White Elephant sale that will feature spring and Easter items. The date is March 15 from 2 to 4:30 pm. We are in need of five volunteers to help on the day of the event. The cost is \$5.00 per child and includes their snack and \$3.00 for adults.
