Ron Bailey

The Canadian Northern Society is privileged to hold in trust for future generations of researchers and historians some wonderful railway artifacts and books donated by long-time supporter and Railway Hall of Famer R.M. (Ron) Bailey.

Many of our members will know that Ron is a keen railway historian, having been a railroader all of his life, retiring as Regional Chief Engineer of CN's Mountain Region in the mid-1980s. Ron is another living link to the old Canadian Northern Railway—his father W.R. (Bill) Bailey was a locomotive engineer

who began his career on the Canadian Northern, working in prairie terminals like Radville, Saskatoon, Humboldt, and Kamsack over the years.

The Society library in the Camrose depot has been significantly enhanced with the donation of many hard-cover books including historical volumes on Canadian railway heritage such as *Steam on the Kettle Valley*, *The Great Scot*—an autobiography of Donald Gordon (a former CN President)—and *Canadian Pacific—A Century of Corporate Power*. In addition there are many fascinating U.S. railroad books such as *The Nickel Plate Road—History of a Great Railroad*, *The Lackawanna Story*, and *Men of Erie*.

Ron has also donated much of his engineering survey equipment and related field notes from a lifetime career on the Canadian National that can be displayed as part of future engineering exhibits, and used for educational programs. A number of framed prints featuring various railway themes were also donated and have found their way to Big Valley and Meeting Creek. In addition, his collection included some scale models from a family model layout that are now on display, including a model of the Big Valley Canadian Northern Railway depot that Ron built. Further artifacts included a depot spitoon, a telegraph key, and an antique station platform lamp from the depot at Redditt, Ontario, that is now safely held at Meeting Creek.

Special thanks to Ron's son Grant who made the arrangements to donate this wonderful collection of lifetime history to the Canadian Northern Society, and to Bruce Smith for lending his truck to load up the items in Edmonton.

Ron and his wife Marion have recently located from their south side home in Edmonton into a new seniors apartment complex where they are now settling into and enjoying.



We are very proud of our station and enjoy watching people make use of our grounds and get excited about our displays and use the community meeting room.


Train days are special as we meet people from all over the world.

#### MEETING CREEK NEWS

Thanks to Bruce Smith, Lorrie and Dean Tiegs, Lorene Bergstrom, Brent Cheek, Don Gillespie, and Shawn, Liam, and Adam Smith for the continued volunteer efforts at Meeting Creek this summer. It has been a challenge this year keeping up with the grounds maintenance, and pumping water from under the station given the significant rainfall we have received this year. However, the country is finally green, and there is water in the creek for a change.

Storms have also caused damage to the vintage tin siding on the grain elevator, and we will need to replace several tin squares on the cupola—requiring a specialized contractor. At the station, we are in the process of developing an improved sump and drainage system to pump out the storm water from under the building that generally accumulates in the springtime, but has been there all summer this year.

We have written our local members of the Legislative Assembly and Alberta Community Development to seek support for continued funding for the preservation of the Meeting Creek elevator, which now is in need of some major repair work around the foundation of the structure.

This work was identified in an inspection conducted by Alberta Community Development in 2008, and we now hope to apply for funding and implement the repairs. Further to the Meeting Creek specific repairs, we have requested a meeting with the deputy minister to discuss the merits of developing a "grain elevator corridor" between Meeting Creek and Rowley, with the emphasis being on the continued preservation and long term use of the remaining wooden elevators at Meeting Creek, Stettler, Big Valley, and Rowley. We believe that significant funding resources will need to be set aside into the future if these structures are going to continue to survive in the small rural communities.

Our contractor, Graham Chillingworth, has done an excellent job of re-roofing the Canadian Northern section toolhouse with cedar shingles, and the building will soon receive a new coat of paint.

Thanks to David Buhler and Bruce Smith for repairing the telegraph practice set, and to R.M. Bailey and Grant Bailey for the donation of the antique platform lamp (rescued from the former National Transcontinental depot at Redditt, Ontario,

before its demolition in the 1980s) that would have adorned the outside wall of the station when it was first opened in 1913.

We continue to need help at Meeting Creek for the many maintenance tasks that are required in preserving a 1917 elevator and 1913 railway station that are now starting to have structural issues manifest themselves. As a group, we will need to focus on this reality over the next year or so to ensure we are equipped for the next 25 years of preservation challenges.

With Meeting Creek being such a tiny community, individuals from outside of the immediate hamlet are welcome to become involved. Rewarding volunteer tasks include general maintenance and upkeep, painting, general housekeeping, grass and weed cutting and grounds keeping, and developing providing historical interpretation. In addition, the society is seeking those who may be interested in fund raising for future preservation work -another large challenge for a small organization.
